Rationale

France has a specific regulation regarding medical physics which asks for a description of the organisation of medical physics within an hospital (for all departments in relation with ionising radiations: radiotherapy, nuclear medicine, radiology...), called "plan d'organisation de la physique médicale" (POPM).

A joint working group between ASN and the French society of medical physics is currently preparing a guide to help in the writing of POPM.

A question was raised on the "hierarchical" dependence of medical physicists.



The questions

We are currently trying to get information on the organisation of medical physics in European countries.

By organisation, I mean that the information we would like to get is to know if in your country medical physicists are organized in :

- 1. independent departments of medical physics (with a similar level as medical departments)
- 2. all medical physicists are under the responsibility/authority of a medical department
- 3. both situations exist in your countries

Additional question: is one of the above mentioned organisations mandatory regarding the regulation in your country?

The answers

Countries with an independant department of medical physics (directly connected to the hospital management)

(4): Spain, Irland, UK, Poland (only for radiotherapy)

Countries with various organisations

(11): France, Belgium, Luxembourg, Slovenia, Finland, Greece, Sweden, Switzerland, Denmark, Island, Hungary

Countries in which the majority of the medical physicists are under the authority of a medical department

(4): Germany, Austria, Roumania, Bulgaria



The answers

In several countries which did not define the obligation of having independent medical physics departments, it appears however that:

- ✓ independent departments of MP exist in the largest hospitals (Sweden, Greece, Slovenia), or
- ✓ the national scientific body of MP wishes the independence (Bulgaria, France), or
- ✓ the national control authority wishes that this
 organisation becomes mandatory even if it is outside
 its province (Roumania).
